# **Art Design Specs**

#### Pillar Sizes

- All pillars have a circumference of 51 inches
- Height (drop-in space): 9 feet (pillars 1 and 2); 12 foot, 3.5 inches (pillar 3)
- Height (housing floors): 7 foot, 8 inches (pillar 1); 9 foot, 4 inches (pillar 2)

**Medium:** Artwork will be printed, laminated, and attached to the pillars. Proper digital files will need to be provided to us to send to our printer. Covenant House will print and apply the designs to the posts. Please note we are not accepting designs that need to be painted on, or applied directly to, the pillars.

# Stage One—Submission Period

- Submissions should include your name, email, and phone number, along with at least three (3) examples of your previous work. Portfolios or links to the artist's website are acceptable.
- Deadline: December 6

# Stage Two-Final Artist Chosen

- All artists will be notified by email or phone. (December mid-January)
- Artist agreement signed with deadline set for digital files

### Stage Three—Final files received by Covenant House Vancouver (March)

Commission will be paid 40% at time of final artist selection, with remaining 60% paid upon completion and delivery of final files. Art will be owned by Covenant House Vancouver and will remain on display in our 1302 Seymour St. location, for a duration of time, as determined by Covenant House.
